A NOTE FROM THE DIRECTOR

As the students and I have been working on By the Bog of Cats, a question has been persistently on my mind: Why do we engage in this intense, often unsettling process of sharing tragic stories? What value do we find in revisiting the tragic tale of Medea? And what wisdom, what urgent cautions, do we glean from this emotional journey that makes these two fleeting hours so profoundly worth our while? I would argue that this play's central question—what becomes of those discarded by their society—is a question that demands our attention. This haunting tale is not just a narrative of loss, but a mirror, urging us to reflect on how our choices, our neglect, may push others to the margins of their own lives.

ON TRAGEDY

By the Bog of Cats is a ghostly, visceral reimagining of Euripides' Medea, transposed to the mist-shrouded Midlands of Ireland, where the mystical intertwines with the inevitable hand of fate. Carr's poetic yet gritty drama follows the ancient Greek structure, exposing the brutal rawness of betrayal, alienation, and revenge. Here, as in Medea, we encounter a woman on the brink—Hester, much like her mythic counterpart, is trapped between the past and a hostile present. Estranged from her roots, shunned by a prejudiced society, she is abandoned for a younger bride and greater wealth after playing a pivotal role in her lover's rise. Both women's lives are haunted by divine forces, marked by an impending wedding, the absence of a mother, and that inescapable thread of classical tragedy: the fatal flaw. It is the inability to bend in the face of unbearable circumstance that seals their fates. It's thrilling to bring Marina Carr's evocative exploration of Medea to life—allowing us to peer through Hester's eyes, feel the weight of her despair, and recoil at the horrific lengths she goes to reclaim control of her world.

ON ACCENTS

Here at Messiah, our productions are laboratories for learning. Just as students stretch themselves by donning corsets, performing under the demanding glare of a spotlight, or mastering the art of costume design, they also challenge themselves to embrace the sounds and rhythms of unfamiliar cultures. I invite our audience to listen with generosity, to allow the flavors of these accents to transport you to mysterious landscape of the Bog. The goal is not perfect authenticity, but rather to capture the essence of the Irish cadence. Our actors are at various stages of mastering accents, and it's important for them to experiment, fail, succeed, and try again—and they do so with your support and open ears.

Loosely based on Euripides' tragedy *Medea*, this is the prophetic tale of Hester Swane, an Irish Traveller, who attempts to come to terms with a lifetime of abandonment in a world where all whom she has loved have discarded her. Set on the bleak, ghostly landscape of the Bog of Cats, this provocative drama discloses one woman's courageous attempts to lay claim to that which is hers, as her world is torn in two. Hester's long-term lover, Carthage Kilbride, with whom she has a seven-year-old daughter, is selling her "down the river" for the promise of land and wealth through a marriage with the local big farmer's daughter. In the final moments of the action, we witness a woman provoked beyond the limits of human endurance. By the Bog of Cats is a furious, uncompromising tale of greed and betrayal, of murder and profound self-sacrifice.
