

Pastors and scholars alike have long recognized the diversity of theological streams that have helped to shape the Brethren in Christ tradition. The 500th anniversary of Anabaptist beginnings provides a helpful context for reflecting again on this identity, particularly as the North American church prepares to celebrate its own 250th anniversary in 2028. In this lecture, Anabaptist historian John D. Roth will engage these questions from a fresh perspective, drawing especially on insights around the creation of the recent Anabaptist Community Bible.

John D. Roth is project director of MennoMedia's Anabaptism at 500 initiative. Prior to that role, he was a professor of history at Goshen College (1985–2022), where he also served as director of the Mennonite Historical Library and editor of the Mennonite Quarterly Review. Roth has published widely on topics related to Anabaptist-Mennonite history, theology and church life. He is also the founding director of

the Institute for the Study of Global Anabaptism at Goshen College and is active in Mennonite World Conference. He and his wife Ruth enjoy spending time with their grandchildren and are members of Berkey Avenue Mennonite Fellowship in Goshen, Indiana.

The Schrag Lectures are sponsored by Messiah University's Sider Institute for Anabaptist, Pietist and Wesleyan Studies. Named in honor of professor emeritus E. IN HONOR OF THE SCHRAGS

The Schrag Lectures are named to honor Martin Schrag (1919–2002), professor emeritus of church history at Messiah University, and his wife Dorothy Schrag (1918–2017), assistant professor emerita of music. Both were also active in the Brethren in Christ Church.

Martin Schrag was an outstanding scholar of Anabaptist history and theology. His best-known publication was "The European History (1525-1874) of the Swiss Mennonites from Volhynia" (1974), in which he traced his ancestors' journey from Switzerland to Russia and then to the United States. With coauthor John K. Stoner, he also wrote "The Ministry of Reconciliation" (1973). His last book, "Christian Lesher: Nineteenth-Century Brethren in Christ Bishop" (2003), was in press at the time of his passing. His biography is one of three that is featured in "Embracing Scholarship, Piety and Obedience" (2009), published by the Brethren in Christ Historical Society.
